Bachelor and saw the resort was searching for someone to manage the Nordic Center. She applied for the position and made the move to Bend.

She served in that role for 12 years enjoying the more stable snow conditions of western mountains.

"In the east the snow pack is more moist, less stable and often unpredictable," she explains. "Mt. Bachelor is known for having to do the most snow removal of any resort rather than snow making."

A woman of many talents she is also handy building houses. Having built a few in Maine with her then spouse, she decided to design and build her Bend home.

"I was fortunate to find a builder who respected my ideas and decisions. The result is a home I am exceptionally pleased with.

Sue is enjoying the ability to hike and ski in Central Oregon and travel to other parts of the globe. But she is serving on the Drivers and Good Time teams. She wants the members of know that she with all of her experience in the wine and food industries, she can host a great party.

To Your Health

Cataracts are a clouding of the normally clear lens of the eye, usually due to aging changes. A cataract surgeon removes the cloudy lens and inserts a clear lens in its place.

A measurement of the length of the eye is taken in the office pre-op to determine the power of the lens.


There are a few choices that you'll be asked to make about the lens replacement. It can be for distance, near or intermediate vision for single distance, these are lenses paid for by insurance.

There is also a multi-focal lens that helps with reading but have an additional cost. Like a bifocal. If you have astigmatism there is a toric lens to correct astigmatism so glasses don't have to be so thick.

Cataract surgery is normally a short surgery in an outpatient facility. You will use drops in your eye to prevent infection and inflammation postoperatively for a few weeks. Most people notice a big improvement in vision within the first day or so.

REMEMBER, the Village can help if you need transportation or someone to stay with you for a few hours after getting home.
